to the glory of your Name. Amen.

Officiant

May the Almighty God grant us forgiveness of all our sins, and
the grace and comfort of the Holy Spirit. *Amen.*

O God, make speed to save us.

People O God, make haste to help us.

All Glory to the holy and undivided Trinity, one God:
as it was in the beginning, is now, and will be for ever. Amen.

In unison **Psalm 91** *Qui habitat*

1 They who dwell in the shelter of the Most High *

In the coming days, help us to be mindful of children not old enough to be vaccinated, for the immunocompromised, for people still suffering from the impact of illness, and the mental health toll this time is taking on so many. We pray to be generous and accepting of where people are in these uncharted waters. Let us rejoice together for life and breath and for our lives together in you, O Christ. *Amen.*
